

Horticulture Spotlight Air Layering

The process of air layering is a way to create a root system in the middle of a stem. This can be used to cut back a leggy plant and create a new plant from the healthy attractive top at the same time. The steps are not hard. Many plants can be air layered. Consider trying this on crotons, aralias, azaleas. Magnolias, Schefflera, holly, ficus, boxwood, roses, myrtles, fruit trees and citrus. Look for plants and small trees with soft woody branches. Spring is an ideal season to do this because the outer bark is thinner and softer.

The supplies you need are a small sharp knife, sphagnum moss, plastic wrap, and ties. The sharp knife is to scrape the outer layer of bark off around the entire stem gently. Do not cut into the stem. Scrape about 1 to 2 inches vertically. Saturate the sphagnum moss with water in a container. Take a handful of saturated moss and completely cover the scraped area. Wrap the moss with plastic and secure the wrapped moss with ties. If you are air layering a larger tree, you may do multiple areas on the same tree.

Keep the moss wet and wait at least a month before opening. Choose an area you utilize frequently to check on the process. For a smaller plant, a protected area like your lanai will provide indirect light and humidity. Air layering has a 90% success rate. Many plants will produce roots in 6 to 10 weeks and can be separated and planted. Be patient, some air layering can take up to a year.

FESTIVAL PLANT SALE



Jr Garden Club Newsletter

Belle Terre Elementary

The garden is thriving. Bush beans were planted in a space that had Mexican Petunias. The children and volunteers were able clear the area of this invasive plant and make it ready for vegetable planting. The children planted bush beans which have already sprouted.

The strawberry plants are still producing strawberries, the children's favorite. One day the children were able to pick arugula, broccoli shoots and strawberries to make a salad in the cafeteria. Unfortunately, there was not enough strawberries for the grownups. Peas were planted along the fence (which acts as a support). We noticed some were not getting enough water so Tony Bolanos was asked to make an adjustment to the irrigation.

Stephen at Hammock Gardens suggested planting potatoes and he showed me how to do it. In addition, the children watched a video on how to grow potatoes in a container. The potatoes came from Helen O'Mara's uncle up north who gave her some organic fingerlings which had sprouts started. As you can see the potatoes are thriving in their container.

Some of the carrots were ready for picking which they learned how to tell when they could be picked. We showed them how to pull them up using a rocking and gentle pulling motion. You would have thought it was their birthday because they were so excited. They each pulled two which they said one was for lunch and one for dinner.

The push is on to get the garden ready for the school tours. That means planting and mostly weeding. I decided to mulch the beds to keep the weeds down and luckily there was money to pay for it. Dan from Gospel Gardens offered to help with the weeding and came one afternoon after work to help. One child said he was a better weeder than any of us put together. One of his crew picked up 30 bags of mulch and dropped it off at the garden.

I got a butterfly/caterpillar poster, had it laminated and put on the gate. Now when anyone sees a butterfly or caterpillar, they run over to the poster to see if they can find it and read about it. I snapped a picture of a black swallowtail caterpillar munching on my dill which they were excited to see. There is dill in the garden.

The bluebird house has four eggs and an angry Mama if you get too close. We planted a native blueberry bush which will provide food for them. The berries are edible to us but very little and bitter.

At Adrienne Harrell's suggestion, we painted plant identity sticks (paint stirrers) with colors for annual, perennial and native so you can easily see what a plant is.

- May 9th is the date for the District VI Spring meeting at the Hammock Dunes Resort, Palm Coast. The Arrangers' Guild was asked to make the floral centerpieces for each table. The Garden Club has donated funds for the purchase of the flowers and greens needed.

The instructor for class 5 was Penny Decker. Class 5 used features, accessories, and bases (optional).

A feature is necessary for the design but should not be plant material. An accessory is added to a design but if removed, should not take away from the original design.

A base can be used to set the design on, but it should be portioned in size and weight to the design. A base could be a simple object like a piece of wood. A base is optional.

Your design needs the 4 Attributes of a Design: Beauty, Harmony, Distinction, and Expression.

Our next class will be Class 6, April 11, 2023: Make a design that shows what Florida is all about!

Examples: A Florida floral design could show something about beaches, golf courses, or sunshine, just to name a few that represent Florida!

Selection of the Month



Deborah and John Sewell of Cochise Ct. have been recognized as April 2023, Selection of the Month by The Garden Club at Palm Coast.

Originally from Utah, they moved to Palm Coast in 2015 to get away from snow. They have created their colorful landscape with many bromeliads, starting with only two, and now they are climbing and multiplying on their Queen palm tree. They are grateful for the generosity of their friends and neighbors for sharing their plants.

Their most prominent variety of bromeliads is the common Neoregelia Martin, which produces a large number of pups (babies). Given a lot of sun they will become a beautiful red/pink.

They also have several bird of paradise blooming throughout their landscape. The one near the front door entrance is well sheltered from frost and cold winds and blooms year-round.

In the back patio area facing the canal they have much diversity of plants such as: blooming cactus, bright pink crown of thorns in a multi-color ceramic boot, Flaming Katy orange kalanchoe, calla lily, several jade plants, snake plants, a dracaena (corn plant),

variegated philodendron, a beautiful wooden fish driftwood with air plants attached, pink amaryllis, other varieties of bromeliads, orchids, a stunning Alocasia Polly (elephant ears) and even a money tree (*Pachira aquatica*). And it all started with just 2 bromeliads!
