

Horticulture Spotlight

Creating a Bromeliad Tree Sharon Smith

This is a nice project if you have extra bromeliads laying around. I used a dead tree that I cut back to the trunk and a few main branches. You can use a live tree or sturdy trellis.

I started with about 10 bromeliads. They varied in color and were medium sized. I used twine and wrapped the twine around the base of the bromeliad and the v shaped area of the tree limbs multiple times until it seemed secure from all directions. Some needed re wrapping after a few days so expect to reinforce a few days later. If there is a frost, you can easily cover the tree with a sheet.

Water frequently while they are settling in. Only the pups will attach to the tree. Watch for sunburn. You might need to rearrange a few. The plants will need watering if there is no rain for more than a week. As the pups appear the tree will get fuller and more beautiful.



McKee Gardens Sharon Smith

Located in Vero Beach Florida, McKee Gardens is a fun day trip. It takes about 2 ½ hours, most of the trip on I 95. The Gardens are 18 acres but seem much larger. The park is 100 years old. It was originally called McKee Jungle Gardens and built by Walter Sexton. It was a tourist attraction on US 1 and was much larger with animals and plants from around the world. Sections were sold off and the city of Vero Beach preserved and renovated what was left.

The park is oval shaped with multiple paths through the tropical landscape. Plants are from all over the world. There are also ponds with various water plants. And lastly there are buildings and structures that were brought in 100 years ago.

On most Tuesdays, there are guided tours of the gardens that are included in the admission price. I highly recommend doing the tour to learn the history of the gardens as well as featured areas and plants. About once a month there is also a class you can sign up for. We signed up for a class about water lilies.

In the classroom we learned about the 3 main types of water lillies in the park. The rest of the class took place in the ponds. The lilies are grown in clay filled containers that are submerged. Our instructors pulled up the plants she wanted to trim or relocate and we watched as she worked and showed us how she maintains the plants in the ponds. She pointed out the unique structures of these aquatic plants and passed them around so we could examine them closely. It was an amazing day.

We will be making pastel colors for Spring and the Theme of our new District Director, Valerie Seinfeld, is Bees so we will try to incorporate Bee decorations into the arrangements. The Instructor for Class 6 was Margaret Kirkpatrick. The floral design was to express the title "FLORIDA". Margaret was very impressed by the student's designs.

For a flower show the following tips were discussed:

- Condition leaves and greenery the day before the show
- Bring a small tool kit
- Bring a rolling cart to put supplies on.
- Know the environment of the show room. Tropical flowers do not do well in cold AC rooms; they will turn black. Try to find out what the temperature will be overnight and bring extra flowers the next day in case some need to be replaced.
- Remove lilies with pollen or lose points
- Mechanics can show but need to be clean for perfection
- When using a backdrop board for color, try different color boards as they change the look of a design
- Plant material will dictate the shape

Selection of the Month



Michael Racano and Charles LaFlamme of Arrowhead Drive have been recognized as May 2023 Selection of the Month, by The Garden Club at Palm Coast.

They moved from Rhode Island to Palm Coast in 2013 when they retired. Michael was a caterer and made floral arrangements and Charles was a Director of Nurses. Michael is always working in the yard, and he propagates his own plants. He likes to buy reduced plants at Walmart and brings them back to life. Charles also likes to spend his free time working in the garden and watering. They like to make their own fertilizer by blending vegetables and fruit peels, and they use coffee grinds and eggshells on the lawn.

This curb appeal landscape was discovered at the end of March, and we were amazed by the abundance of colorful flowers and the diversity of plants. The front bed has many zinnias, bush daisy, firecracker, phlox, roses, amaryllis, lantana, dusty miller, pansies, coleus, potato vines, and milkweed. They recently added 60 Asiatic lilies, 60 gladiolas, multiple color sunflowers, white casablanca and red stargazer lilies.

The top of the garage has climbing red bougainvillea, and yellow mandevilla surround above the front door area. On the left side they have cleome, calla lilies, mums, bleeding hearts, foxglove, climbing ligustrum and bamboo. Over time they have created and recently expanded their backyard with leftover pavers and other materials left by contractors. They have two gorgeous red and pink bougainvillea in pots, drift roses, dianthus, and red calibrachoa parviflora. They have a pagoda with several hanging pots. They even have an orange flowering nasturtium in which they make pesto with the leaves and use the blossoms in salads. Nothing goes to waste in their gardens!
