DUES AND FINANCES

In case you missed the last meeting or just want more information:

The club has 2 categories of money - restricted and unrestricted. The restricted money is revenue raised or received for a specific purpose such as scholarships, grants, Penny Pines. The money cannot be used for other things. The unrestricted or operational money is used to run the club and includes the PO Box, liability insurance, fees and licenses to FL, office expenses, storage unit, meeting costs, mailing (emails service). Also within the operational money are the various programs that the club supports such as Jr. Garden Club, Plants for Pleasure, Arbor Days, Selection of the Month, Library Christmas Tree.

It has been several years since the dues were raised but prices have continued to increase. Of this year's \$30 dues, \$12 went to FFGC, and \$1 to District leaving the club with \$17. Our club is struggling to meet the operational costs and relying heavily on fundraisers. This year has been particularly tough because we missed 2 meetings and have not yet had the Treasures in the Attic fundraiser. To totally rely on dues to cover our operation costs including our programs, the dues would need to be around \$77 (with 160 members). The board is continuing to look for ways to cut the operational costs and increase revenue.

To strengthen the clubs financial situation, the board motioned in March to raise the dues to \$50 per person, \$65 per couple. This was voted and passed by club members at the March club meeting. The dues for our club are still less than other nearby clubs such as Deland (\$72) and New Smyrna Beach (\$75) Fundraisers will still be necessary but there will be less of an urgency.

Recently a student sent a list of questions asking a member of our garden club to answer. Follows is an excerpt of some of Kenetha Kilmurray's answers that were truly thought provoking.

From what you have seen or experienced, has gardening improved your mental health (or the club's mental health?)

I do not think that there is a person who has not felt a feeling of well being and pride after spending time in their gardens or yards. There is a kind of peace and rhythm one finds when you are surrounded by the colors and smells of plants and earth; the sounds of winds and bees; the feel of soil in your hands. I find that I can think problems out and calm down when I am in the garden. It is my sanctuary, I am truly communing with nature and God and that solutions will reveal themselves.

Any stories that make you happy to think about or any topics related to the benefits of gardening?

YES! KIDS! These little human beings are our lifeline to the future for so many things. I did not realize until I volunteered to help with the Junior Garden Club just how important they are. Most kids do not realize where their food comes from. All they know is a grocery store. I cannot tell you how proud these kids are when they eat the first strawberries they planted, when they pull carrots from the ground for the first time, when they watch all the stages of a butterfly develop on the milkweed they planted. Oh the joy and wonder on their faces is so worth the work. We teach them that it is OK if a plant dies-it happens-let's try it someplace else. We teach them to respect land and water. We teach them how to research a problem and come up with a solution and guess what, there could be more than one solution. But what they have taught us is joy. The joy of being able to do it on their own. The joy of success. The joy of getting dirty. The joy of gardening with friends. And that is what gardening is all about!



WINGED ELM

The Winged Elm in my front yard was planted in 1993. I had never heard of this tree. My boyfriend at the time had lived in Palm Coast for about 10 years and worked for a well known landscaping company. He designed a beautiful landscape for my property that after 30 years is thriving with a few modifications.

The Winged Elm shades the southeast corner of my house and the driveway for 9 months of the year. It is a bit messy in the late fall/early winter as it loses its leaves. As a transplant from New Jersey, I enjoy walking through the leaves on the driveway. In the early spring, it buds a pink color and sheds as well, and again about a month later when the leaves open.

Two years ago, tragedy struck. The lot next door was cleared and the roots of my tree were cut as they extended almost halfway across the lot. Would I lose my tree? Would it land on my house? Or on the new house next door?

I consulted a local well known tree expert. The news was reassuring. Although I would not know for sure about my tree's survival for three years, he felt the chances were good. The root system was strong and went in all directions, so only a small portion was removed. He felt the cuts were clean and he neatened up a couple that weren't. He also measured the height as 55 feet tall, which exceeds the literature by 15 feet.

Last spring my tree leafed out evenly but the canopy was not quite as dense. This spring she is a little fuller and a darker green than last year. She is a beauty. By far the largest shade tree on my street and visible halfway down the block.

Jeff and Steve's garden is not merely a collection of plants; it's a testament to their passion, creativity, and dedication to bringing beauty to their parcel of Palm Coast. Thank you for enhancing the beauty of our community.
