









DYK: When the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs (FFGC) conceptualized the State Wildflower license plate to support their dream that Florida's native wildflowers would be valued not only for their ecological importance but also celebrated as part of Florida's cultural heritage, the first step was selecting a native state wildflower! They chose the genus *Coreopsis*, of which Florida has 12 native species.



Commonly referred to as Tickseeds, they bloom vibrantly across our landscapes in spring through fall.

In 1991, FFGC successfully lobbied the state Legislature to make *Coreopsis* the official state wildflower, paving the way for the plates to become a reality. After another 9 years of dedication and hard work the first plate hit the road in June 2000 and this year we celebrate 25 years of native wildflower outreach and conservation!

Pollinator profile: Red-spotted purple

Contrary to its name, the Red-spotted purple (*Limenitis arthemis astyanax*) is neither red nor purple, but a vibrant shade of blue. These beauties employ expertlevel defense strategies both as a caterpillar and an adult. In the larval stage, they construct resting places out of their own frass, which is unappealing to predators. As adults, they mimic the poisonous Pipevine swallowtail (*Battus philenor*).


